When I was asked to write a few words about Niki Kearby and Betty Moynan, my mind flooded with memories of happy

times. Both of these women were among the original founders of PFLAG New Orleans.

Betty Moynan was among the founding members of PFLAG New Orleans. She was the mother of 3 children: 2 gay sons and a lesbian daughter.

When AIDS came along, she became very active because her son had AIDS and eventually died from it. Betty worked tirelessly with Project Lazarus and the NO/AIDS Taskforce (now Crescent Care).

Betty attended all of our support group meetings and started a group just for PFLAG moms. We all went out to lunch once a month on a Sunday and talked about our children. That's where I really got to know and love her. She was loving and kind and always happy to welcome new members to the group. She will truly be missed. **Dr. Niki Kearby** and her partner Betty Caldwell worked together to help start PFLAG. In the beginning, they looked for places to hold meetings like churches and hospitals. Once we got settled in one place (until Katrina), they came to all of our support group meetings and served on our Board of Directors for many years. The Scholarship Program was near and dear to Niki's heart and she served as chairman for it during the nineties. She handpicked every member of the committee and made sure we were kept busy. I was selected for the committee because I was the mother of a gay son and I worked in higher education.

During this time, she also served on the PFLAG National Board and helped them establish their scholarship program based on ours. Niki and Betty were kind and generous and well loved by everyone.

After Niki retired from her medical practice, they moved to Santa Fe and established a Scholarship program in New Mexico. Of course, they worked with PFLAG Santa Fe.

Niki and Betty opened their home in the French Quarter to the National Board when they met here and served dinner to 50 people. I know because Betty and I were the cooks.

This couple will be greatly missed by the entire LGBTQ+ Community. They worked hard for everyone.

The Inspirational Journey


I was licensed to practice law in Louisiana this year. Some people would say that this is my biggest accomplishment, and in some ways it is. It is the pinnacle of my academic career, but what makes this such a proud moment for me is knowing that I was able to make it this far in my life as a trans person.

Growing up, I thought that gender roles always had and always would exist, and I didn't question the role I was born into as a female. Even though I knew on some level I was different, I couldn't place exactly how. I still wore dresses occasionally, contrasting these unplaced feelings with hyper-femininity.



Throughout my life, the concept of being transgender was always an oddity to me. The only time I ever heard about trans people was on the news or on talk shows; and being raised in a conservative Catholic household, the topic was more than taboo. I had no room to explore my sexuality much less my gender. My tomboy-ish tendencies and my deep emotional attachment to female friends were written off as me being a southern country girl who wasn't afraid to get dirty.

American Red Cross Is <u>Looking for Study Participants</u> (study launches in early May)



ADVANCE Study Change continues with you...

Three of the nation's largest blood centers, Vitalant, OneBlood, and the American Red Cross are launching a pilot study through a contract funded by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) that could potentially lead to a significant change to blood donor eligibility for men who have sex with men.2

The study will include gay and bisexual men who are interested in donating blood, and who have had sex with at least one other man in the three months before joining in the study.

Potential participants will complete a short survey to assess if they meet the study inclusion criteria. If the potential participants are qualified, staff conducting the study will enroll the participants into the study and obtain informed consent.

Eligible participants will also need to be **between the ages of 18 and 30 years**, and also will need to live in one of the eight communities (including Baton Rouge/New Orleans) where the pilot study is being done.

Looking To A Brighter Future By Sally Michelle Jackson Co-Host of Expanding the Rainbow

After our disastrous year of 2020, it might be hard to see anything positive. The light at the end of the tunnel is becoming a little clearer and looking less and less like an oncoming locomotive and more like actual daylight, possibly partly cloudy but much better than a train-wreck. 2020 was a horrible year for so many reasons but now is a chance for 2021 to rise from the ashes of last year and soar as the beautiful Phoenix. But how can it when we started the year with attacks on democracy and our Capitol--as well as the possibility that Covid-19 may never completely go away?
